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## A Sculptor's Unexpected Christmas Gift

In all kinds of weather, crowds gather at the foot of Manhattan around a giant bronze beast. Many people call it simply the Bull or the Bull of Wall Street; its official name is *Charging Bull*. Its admirers pose for photos and rub its shiny testicles for good luck.

The bull is such a fixture that it seems to have been here forever. But it actually came fairly recently, arriving in the Financial District at the end of 1989. How it came to stand just outside the northern gate of Bowling Green is an amusing tale.

On October 19, 1987, the New York Stock Exchange lost more than 20% of its value in a single day, which became known as Black Monday. The city reeled temporarily, but it bounced back in an upward-trending bull market. To celebrate the resiliency of the stock market and the forge-ahead spirit of New York, sculptor Arturo Di Modica created a 3½-ton, 18-foot long statue, *Charging Bull*.

On the evening of December 15, 1989, Di Modica anonymously delivered the statue as a gift to the city. A Christmas tree had gone up in front of the New York Stock Exchange that day, and the sculptor deposited his giant present under the tree—then took off as fast as he could in a truck big enough to haul the bull.

The next day, Wall Street workers gasped in wonder when they saw the great bronze beast for the first time. Word quickly spread, and the streets filled with gawkers and admirers. The media went wild.

## Christmas at Macy's

Long before *Miracle on 34<sup>th</sup> Street* created an indelible association between Macy's and Christmas, the store was celebrating the holiday like nobody else. Soon after opening in 1858 at its original location, on Sixth Avenue near 14<sup>th</sup> Street, Macy's became one of the first retailers in the country to feature an in-store Santa. In 1874 Macy's began to thrill December shoppers with elaborately decorated windows. One window displayed porcelain dolls from around the world, and another window featured scenes from *Uncle Tom's Cabin*, complete with movable parts. In 1883 reindeer pulled Santa on a mechanical sleigh that traveled across all the store's front windows.

It seems that the window displays become more elaborate each year, not just at Macy's but at other retailers, like Lord & Taylor. Visiting the windows is a must on the end-of-year to-do list for many New Yorkers and visitors.

Everyone seemed to love the bull, except for higher-ups at the New York Stock Exchange. By the end of the day, they made sure that the bull was hauled away.

How quickly the sculpture had won the hearts of New Yorkers! The public and press screamed for the return of the bull. As quickly as it had appeared and then disappeared, it came back again, this time to the bit of city land where it now attracts throngs of tourists and city folk.

That spot is an ironically fitting home for *Charging Bull*. In Dutch Colonial times, the cattle market was located there.
